Alumni and Brothers Unite in the Face of Chapter Violations Brothers Agree to Take Action and Enforce New Rules to Improve House Environment

This past semester brought some new challenges and opportunities to the fraternity. Recently, the active chapter was found in violation of the Sigma Phi Delta Risk Reduction policy and also in violation of University of Illinois Inter-fraternity Council (IFC) regulations for providing alcohol to a person under 21 years of age. The alumni and active chapters have worked together to address this issue and have done so to the satisfaction of the Sigma Phi Delta Supreme Council.

The actives and alumni present at the April alumni meeting agreed that the chapter should commit to a probationary period. The full meeting minutes of the April meeting are posted on our website (**www.spdillini.org**), but here is a summary of the probationary period requirements:

- 1) Effective immediately, there is absolutely no alcohol allowed at the chapter house until the end of the Fall 2007 semester.
- 2) The active chapter will hold no social events during the Fall 2007 semester. An exception has been made for dry (non-alcoholic) philanthropic events.
- 3) Every active member and pledge will perform 15 hours of community service during the Fall 2007 semester. At least 10 of these hours must be completed in groups of four or more.

4) Every active member and pledge will attend an alcohol awareness presentation during the Fall 2007 semester.

We also discussed several permanent requirements of the active chapter and made a formal recommendation that the chapter no longer hold social events at the chapter house. With the cooperation of the actives and the alumni, this experience can be used to change the culture of the active chapter to provide a safe and fun collegiate environment.

It is my hope that we will have many eager candidates accept nominations for office at the annual meeting on June 15. Our goal for the Alumni Board should be to carry over significant experience while infusing new ideas to the leadership team. Creating a new Alumni Board from current officers willing to continue their service and new volunteers that are eager to help should accomplish that goal.

At the annual meeting, in addition to officer elections we will discuss the future of the active chapter as well as improvements to the chapter house. The meeting will be held at 6 p.m. on June 15th in the Woodfield Room at The Ram Restaurant and Brewery in Schaumburg. Aaron Brown '98 Paving the Way Towards the Mission to Mars Aaron Is Working on the Mathematical Algorithms to Bring the Trajectories to Fruition

Aaron has worked for the past six and a half years as an Aerospace Engineer at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas. For the first six years, Aaron worked in the Trajectory Operations Group for the International Space Station (ISS) program, and was ultimately certified as an ISS Trajectory Operations Officer (call sign "TOPO") in Mission Control. Aaron's responsibilities as a TOPO included monitoring and maintaining the real-time orbit of the Space Station, planning and

supporting ISS reboosts with his Russian counterparts and coordinating debris avoidance maneuvers in the event of potential collisions with orbital debris. "Working in Mission Control is extremely demanding, and at the same time extremely fun," Aaron says. "I am very fortunate to have worked with such an amazing team of people."

In December, Aaron decided to hang up his headset and transfer to a new group. This group is heading up orbit operations within his division for NASA's new Constellation Program. This program is designing the Orion spacecraft, which will replace the Space Shuttle when it is retired. Orion will ferry people to and from the ISS, will take the first human crew back to the moon and will eventually take us on to Mars. Aaron's role in this new group is to determine the mathematical algorithms that will be used in the ground software for plotting out the trajectories of the Orion vehicle. "At NASA, it's a once-in-a-career opportunity to work on a brand new space vehicle," Aaron says. "So far, it has been very exciting and I'm

looking forward to seeing this new vehicle come to life."




Concept photo of the Orion vehicle as it orbits around the moon.

Thad Briggs '90 Works on the Edge of Technology with Nokia Cell Phone Chip Thad Says He Developed His Teamworking Skills in Sigma Phi Delta

For the past six years, **Thad Briggs '90** has worked in the silicon technology development group at Texas Instruments. His current project is the 45 nanometer technology node. The "45nm" refers to the effective transistor gate length. To put things in perspective, a typical virus ranges from 20 to 300nm in size.

In the semiconductor industry, each new technology node is 70% physically smaller than the previous one, with a new node being introduced about every two years (the famous "Moore's Law"). Scaling the chip size serves two cost-driven purposes: it increases the number of chips per wafer, and it allows

more features to be included in the same size footprint. The 45nm driver product at T.I. will be a cell phone chip for Nokia whose functions today are performed by two chips. The first 45nm products will be available in 2008, and will replace the 65nm node currently in production.

As a process integration engineer, Thad has exposure to the design, manufacturing, testing and reliability sides of chip production. His work involves the chip interconnect using 70nm copper leads separated by a porous low-k dielectric film. He admits that being a team leader on a fast-paced development schedule is a challenge, but the journey to completion is always fun and rewarding.

Thad says that his experience as a member of Sigma Phi Delta has benefited him in many ways. "One is the ability to come to a solution with groups who sometimes have conflicting ideas and goals."


