

Former Executive Director Reflects on Success in Career (and Blind Dates)

Sometimes Bob Featheringham wonders how his life would be different if he hadn't joined the fraternity that helped to shape it.

As the former executive director of Sigma Phi Delta's national organization, Featheringham has seen a lot in his day. He began his SPD brotherhood at the Indiana Institute of Technology in 1958. Since then, he's remained heavily involved in the brotherhood that built him.

When asked why he joined Sigma Phi Delta 55 years ago, Featheringham said that at that time, most of Indiana Tech's student body was comprised mostly of engineers.

"Joining a 'social' fraternity when I could be with other engineers seemed ludicrous, furthermore, Lambda was seen as the leading (scholarship, intramural sports, leadership, etc.) house on campus. When I asked myself the question, 'Why not join the 'best' fellow engineering students who excelled in all ways,' I could not conceive of an alternative," said Featheringham.

Upon graduation, Featheringham began what would become a 39-year career with the defense industry, advancing to Division Vice President and General Manager with a defense contracting company.

Retiring in 1999, Featheringham started his own business with his current wife, Connie, called Two Feathers Consulting. Two Feathers provided business development for companies that were seeking to work with the Army at Ft. Monmouth, New Jersey, until Ft. Monmouth was moved to Maryland in 2011.

Featheringham had an extensive career, and he credits some of his success back to his time in Sigma Phi Delta.

"As an officer in Lambda Chapter, I developed many skills that propelled me forward in my career. My superiors, subordinates, and customers use words like ethical; integrity, honesty, loyalty; management skills, mature judgment; leadership qualities, best leader I ever served, when describing the qualities they observed in me. These attest to my application of the fraternity's Code of Ethics to my work environment, which led to my advancements."

Just as Sigma Phi Delta has given to Featheringham, Featheringham, in turn,

recognizes the importance of giving back to his fraternity, both monetarily and through his time.

"Once I became Executive Director I gained insight into how precarious the fraternity's financial situation was. I took on the additional duties of fundraising chairman, hoping to invigorate the moribund alumni donation program. And from 2002 through 2009, I raised over \$235,000 from alumni and friends," said Featheringham. "I continue to support the fraternity financially because I believe that it's important to populate the profession with Sigma Phi Delta men that subscribe to our Object, Code of Ethics, and Ritual."

Sigma Phi Delta is unique in many ways, some of which Featheringham has made sure to point out. On the financial side, however, they are particularly unique in that SPD is a volunteer organization. This means that, unlike their competitors, Sigma Phi Delta is in charge of recruiting its own members and administering an international organization.

"Without strong financial and volunteer help from alumni, Sigma Phi Delta (the smallest and youngest of the three engineering fraternities) will atrophy and die. How will our profession differ if it does not include ethical engineers that subscribe to our Code of Ethics?" asks Featheringham. His hope is that the good brothers of Sigma Phi Delta will uphold their bond of brotherhood and not allow this to happen.

Looking back on the impact that Sigma Phi Delta has had on his life, Feathering realizes that his life, both personally and professionally, would have been quite different if he had never chosen to rush.

"In the fall of 1958, Lambda brother Mike Koch '61 asked me to accompany him on a double date with him and his girlfriend. Mine was to be a blind date, and two years later, she became my wife. (Brother Vince Kavlick '60 was my best man.) Unfortunately she died in 1995 after 34 years of marriage. My life would have been entirely different had I not gone on that date."

What's next for Brother Featheringham?

"I am not sure what the future holds, but I would like to be able to make a contribution somehow, some way. Retiring fully is not appealing, so I continue to be a work in progress, seeking new opportunities."




